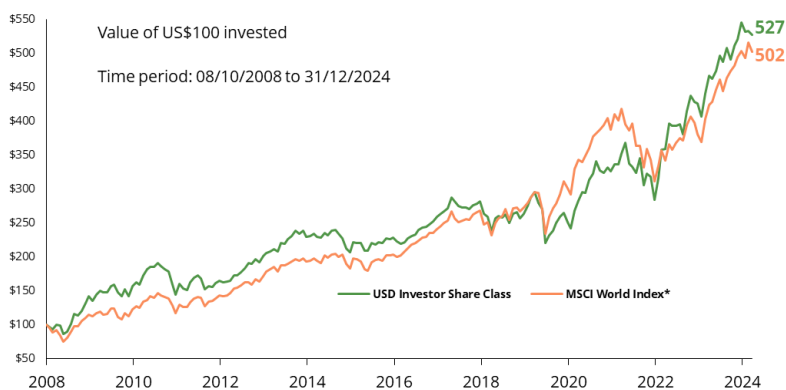

COMMENTARY

The late Sir John Templeton was labelled by Money Magazine in 1999 as “arguably the greatest global stock picker of the century”. For good reason. Had you invested \$10,000 in his fund at launch in 1954, you would have amassed over \$2m by the time he sold to Franklin Resources in 1992 (15% p/a). By comparison, that \$10,000 “only” grew to \$100,000 invested in the S&P 500 (6% p/a). His formula was simple - buy a globally diversified portfolio of low-priced, out-of-favour companies. That’s exactly what we aim to do at Ranmore.

One of his favourite maxims was to “Buy at the point of maximum pessimism and Sell at the point of maximum optimism”. This approach makes sense because at these extremes, you’re very likely to be buying below intrinsic value and selling above intrinsic value – the objective of most great investors.

The problem is that most people find this very difficult to do. And that’s because these periods of “maximum optimism” or “maximum pessimism” often continue for longer than expected. If you buy too early or sell too early, you risk looking foolish and no one wants to risk that, least of all highly paid portfolio managers! That’s why most people buy what is popular. Unfortunately, this means paying a higher price, which usually means lower returns over the long-term. Despite investors often being aware they aren’t getting value when buying what’s popular, they do so hoping they’ll spot the time when the “trend is no longer their friend”. But downturns are often sharp and happen when least expected, meaning gains quickly become losses.

So, where in the world do we find “maximum optimism”? We submit large-cap, US equities - not too surprising after back-to-back gains exceeding 20% from the S&P500. The WSJ reported that investors poured over \$1trn into US equities last year, confirming this view. These flows occurred notwithstanding: high index concentration levels, high valuations for large companies beyond the “Enormous 8”, spiralling national debt levels, rising bond yields, and a stretched US consumer. Perhaps this will be the first “party” in history that never ends, but even Warren Buffett prefers cash to US equities right now and high levels of corporate insider selling data suggests he’s not alone. With only 15% of our fund invested in US equities we’re happy to risk looking foolish, knowing we’re in good company.

Meanwhile the total return in USD from Global mid-sized companies was 11%, Global small companies returned 7%, the MSCI Europe was barely up (thanks to dividends), and the Brazilian stock market fell 30%. We’re pleased to have extracted a real return in 2024 from investing in selected companies within these areas of “maximum pessimism”. The good news is that we’re paying far less for a dollar of earnings than investing in the MSCI World Index - our portfolio’s forward PE is 7 compared to the World Index’s 19. We think Sir John would approve.

The OCF of the Fund was 1.30%, calculated based on operating expenses of the Fund for the 12 month period ended 31/12/23 as a percentage of average Fund net assets of \$88.9m over the same period. The OCF includes all fund operating expenses for the USD, GBP and EUR investor classes, but excludes the 0.5% payable to the financial intermediary for the USD Advisor class. The OCF figure is not applicable to the USD Institutional class. 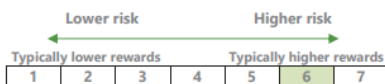
